HOUSTON, TX (October 8, 2020) – Holocaust Museum Houston (HMH) will host the Dismantling Bias: Antisemitism, White Supremacy, and Inequality Virtual Lecture Series presented by H-E-B online starting on October 21, 2020 and culminating on December 2, 2020. Led by renowned historians, authors, and activists, the free programs will explore the origins of racist ideologies and the construction of bias, examine the evolution and repercussions of antisemitism and white supremacy throughout history and deconstruct the ways in which stereotypes, misconceptions and prejudices shape contemporary society and culture.

“I would consider this lecture series necessary viewing for our community, because it will allow audiences to confront their own personal biases through critical conversations and an open dialogue,” said HMH CEO Dr. Kelly Zúñiga.

Kicking off the series on Wednesday, October 21 from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m., professor and writer Dr. Allyson Hobbs will discuss the Black Lives Matter movement and the power of protest. Author Cole Brown will discuss his collection of essays, *Greyboy: Finding Blackness in a White World*, on Wednesday, November 11 from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. Finally, on December 2 from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m., journalist and author of *Coming Out as Dalit* Yashica Dutt will share about the intersection of caste, class and gender in India.
