
On the Cover























2020 Lyndon Baines Johnson Moral Courage Award Virtual Event

Holocaust Museum Houston's annual dinner is our largest fundraising event of the year, providing critical funds to support the institution. Due to the continually evolving COVID-19 pandemic, the Museum made the decision to turn our 2020 LBJ Moral Courage Award Dinner into a virtual event. The online program launched the evening of May 7, 2020, in conjunction with the 75th Anniversary of V-E Day (May 8).

This year's event celebrated moral courage from WWII to the current day, presented the 2020 Lyndon Baines Johnson Moral Courage Award to the family of the late Brigadier General Felix L. Sparks, and culminated with a virtual conversation with WWII Historian and New York Times bestselling author Alex Kershaw and Holocaust Survivor Pinchas Gutter.

2020 Guardian of the Human Spirit Virtual Event

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Holocaust Museum Houston held its annual Guardian of the Human Spirit Luncheon as a virtual event that streamed on Monday, November 9, 2020, raising \$593,000 for general operating funds with a focus on virtual education programming and learning resources to the Houston community and beyond.

The 2020 Guardian of the Human Spirit Virtual Event honored Dr. Milton Boniuk. A longtime humanitarian, philanthropist and author, Dr. Boniuk bases much of his good works on a simple belief: Differences among individuals should be celebrated, not feared. His dedication to an inclusive community includes the creation of Holocaust Museum Houston's Boniuk Library and Boniuk Center for the Future of Holocaust, Human Rights, and Genocide Studies, and Rice University's Boniuk Institute for the Study and Advancement of Religious Tolerance.

The streamed event included a keynote speech from Holocaust Survivor, psychologist and *New York Times* bestselling author Dr. Edith Eger. A native of Hungary, Dr. Eger was just a teenager in 1944 when she and her family were sent to Auschwitz. Her parents were sent to the gas chambers but Edith's bravery kept her and her sister alive. Her memoir entitled *The Choice - Embrace the Possible* became an international bestseller.

Honorary Chairs for this historic event included Houston Methodist President and CEO Dr. Marc L. Boom and Rice University President David W. Leebron. Event chairs were Debra and Steven Cohen, Leisa Holland-Nelson and Bob Bowman, Elyse and Lewis Kalmans and Drs. Ann and Timothy Stout. Abby Daniels and Debbie Tummins served as host committee chairs. HMH CEO Dr. Kelly J. Zúñiga and Board Chair Carl Josehart hosted a small watch party and socially-distanced luncheon for the honoree, his guests and the event chairs.







Engines of Change Teacher Training

Engines of Change Student Ambassador Program The Engines of Change (EoC) Student

Ambassador Program has begun its fifth year by welcoming 45 new Ambassadors and 20 returning Ambassadors into the program. New Student Ambassadors participated in a virtual orientation that included the virtual Holocaust Gallery tour and participated in a discussion about the lessons of the Holocaust that are vital to the world we live in today. The EoC students represent 18 public schools, 5 private schools and 2 homeschool programs from across the greater Houston area. Due to COVID-19, all meetings will be held via Zoom through the first semester. Meetings will resume in person as soon as it is safe to do so.



Virtual Tours

In response to the need for distance learning options, Holocaust Museum Houston has created three virtual tours for classrooms and community groups. Participants can tour the Museum's galleries virtually and interact live with a trained HMH Docent. Tour options include the Holocaust Gallery, the Lester and Sue Smith Human Rights Gallery, the Samuel Bak Gallery and Learning Center, or a combination of the three.

Virtual tours must be scheduled a minimum of two weeks in advance. Tours are available in English and Spanish.



PUBLIC PROGRAMS



SUMMER LEARNING

Summer Learning Experiences were delivered virtually across eight weeks during summer 2020. A total of 55 students participated and many students participated in more than one program, leading to a total of 97 registrants. The programs offered were Model United Nations, Photography and Social Justice, Website for a Cause, and Creative Concepts (poetry). Museum members received discounted tuition as an additional membership benefit.



BOYS AND GIRLS CLUBS OF GREATER HOUSTON

During the summer, HMH partnered with Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater Houston to deliver virtual programming to members at 10 clubs across the greater Houston area. The students participated in a memoir workshop, learned about the Universe of Obligation, and heard from local artist Donkeeboy about the power of art.



GIRL SCOUTS

Girl Scout programs were adapted and delivered virtually. Programs offered in the fall of 2020 include Inside Government for Juniors, Science of Happiness for Cadettes, and Social Innovator for Seniors. These programs focus on civic engagement, solving problems, and finding your voice.



EDUCATOR IN MOTION

Despite the significant impact of COVID-19 on the spring semester, Educator in Motion finished the school year strong by conducting virtual sessions. Overall, the program reached more than 29,000 students across 29 school districts in the greater Houston area and beyond during the 2019-2020 school year. The Museum's educators are now working to support educators with virtual program opportunities.

THE WARREN AND SPECTOR/WARREN FELLOWSHIP

This year, in response to COVID-19 social distancing measures, the Education Department hosted the annual Warren and Spector/Warren Fellowship virtually from August 10 – August 13, 2020. Thirty-eight educators from across the United States joined us throughout the week for virtual lectures, programs, and workshops led by renowned scholars, community activists, educators, and Museum staff. Warren and Spector/Warren Fellows explored the Museum through virtual tours, engaged in interactive discussions and activities on the Holocaust and Human Rights, and became equipped with tools and resources to support students and families in their classrooms. Our Fellows also had the opportunity to be a part of special evening lectures such as Dr. James Waller's talk on the implications of COVID-19 for atrocity



prevention and a Holocaust Survivor talk with Chaja Verveer. Spector/Warren and Warren Fellows learned more about HMH's virtual student programs and free online resources for educators that are available on our website.

Yom HaShoah Virtual Observance

This year's Yom HaShoah Observance, marked by the 75th anniversary of liberation, was held virtually on Sunday, April 19, 2020 on the Museum's Youtube channel

During this annual commemoration, a day of remembrance for the 6 million Jewish people who lost their lives during the Holocaust, we mourned the loss of all who perished, honored those who survived and came together as a community to remember and reflect.

The event was coordinated by the Yom HaShoah Steering Committee and Holocaust Museum Houston.

Latinx Heritage Month

This year, virtual public programming was created for Latinx Heritage Month. HMH hosted authors and scholars who have contributed to highlighting Latinx history, identity, culture, and cross-cultural collaborations. During this month we featured Dr. Paul Ortiz, author of An African and Latinx History of the United States; Dr. Laura Limonic, author of Kugels and Frijoles: Latino Jews in the United States; Dr. Ruth Behar, author and filmmaker of Adio Kerida; Jasminne Mendez, author and poet spoke on the Parsley Massacre of 1937; and Dr. Gabriela González author of Redeeming La Raza: Transborder Modernity, Race, Respectability, and Rights.

Thanks to the translation services of GlobalSpeak Translations, we were able to simultaneously interpret in Spanish, inviting a new audience to our public programming.



PUBLIC PROGRAMS FEATURED EXHIBITION

Dolores Huerta Visits Holocaust Museum Houston

In December 2019, Holocaust Museum Houston Latino Initiatives hosted Dolores Huerta, in correlation with the Smithsonian's bilingual traveling exhibition, *Dolores Huerta: Revolution in the Fields / Revolución en los Campos.* This exhibit shared the compelling story of legendary activist and leader Dolores Huerta (b.1930) and the farm workers movement of the 1960s and 70s. It is a quintessentially American tale of struggle and sacrifice, of courage and victory.

The exhibition explored Huerta's public life as an activist and co-founder of the United Farm Workers Union (UFW), and what led her to become a Latina civil rights icon. In her life as a communicator, organizer, lobbyist, contract negotiator, teacher, and mother, her unparalleled leadership skills helped dramatically improve the lives of farm workers. The evening event was well attended by the community and brought in new visitors to the Museum. The conversation with Huerta was moderated by Marjorie Joseph, Director of the Houston Coalition Against Hate. Opening acts for the evening were Danza Azteca Taxcayolotl and the Latino theater group Teatrx.

The U.S. premiere of *Mandela: Struggle for Freedom*, a rich sensory experience of imagery, soundscape, digital media and objects, explores the earthshaking fight for justice and human dignity in South Africa – and its relevance to issues of today. Visitors can experience the tiny cell where Nelson Mandela spent 18 of his 27 years in prison, take a stand in front of a giant 22-foot long by 9-foot tall armored vehicle, make a virtual protest poster on a digital light table, or enter a secret apartment for freedom fighters forced underground.

Pondering: Artworks by Samuel Bak

Holocaust survivor and artist Samuel Bak creates an astoundingly complex, beautiful and richly colorful journey for viewers in his newest exhibit which opened November 9, 2020 in Holocaust Museum Houston's Samuel Bak Gallery and Learning Center. In 2019, when HMH opened its stunning new building and exhibitions, it did so with a permanent space dedicated to the artist's work. The exhibition includes a selection of 41 works by the artist, created between 1946, when Bak was 13 years old, and 2015.

Bak is recognized internationally as one of the most important artists of his generation. Born in 1933 in Vilna, which is now Vilnius, Lithuania, Bak was recognized from an early age as possessing extraordinary artistic talent. For centuries, Vilna had been known as the "Jerusalem of Lithuania" because it was a major center of Jewish cultural, religious and educational life. Immediately following the German invasion of Poland in September 1939, Vilna and the whole East of Poland was attacked by the USSR. After one month, the Soviets retreated, giving the city to the Republic of Lithuania. An estimated 30,000 Polish Jews found refuge in the city. As Vilna came

under German occupation in 1941, Bak and his family were forced to move into the Vilna Ghetto.

At the age of nine, he had his first exhibition inside the ghetto, even as massive executions and murders perpetrated by the Nazis and their Lithuanian collaborators took place almost every day. At one point, Bak's father secured freedom for his son by smuggling him out of the ghetto in a cloth sack. Bak and his mother escaped the destruction by hiding in a Benedictine convent, and spent most of their time there in an attic. By the end of the war, Bak and his mother were the only members of his extensive family to survive. Bak's four grandparents and father were murdered in the Ponary Forest outside of Vilna.

The artist continues to deal with the artistic expression of the destruction and dehumanization which make up his childhood memories. In his prolific works he questions as he "speaks" about what are deemed to be the unspeakable atrocities of the Holocaust.

Stories of Survival: Object. Image. Memory.

On view January 29 - April 18, 2021

Stories of Survival: Object. Image. Memory. is an epic exhibition showcasing more than 60 personal artifacts brought to America by Survivors of the Holocaust and other genocides. Exploring the relationship between objects, their meaning to the original owner and subsequent significance, each artifact is dramatically paired with oversized photographs by renowned documentarian Jim Lommasson with handwritten responses by Survivors or their family members.

The objects featured in *Stories of Survival* are as everyday as a baby doll and a black suitcase and as symbolic as a young mother's cookbook and a wedding announcement, as saved by Survivors from genocides around the world, including Armenia, Bosnia, Cambodia, Iraq, Rwanda, South Sudan, and Syria. HMH Chief Curator of Collections and Exhibitions Carol Manley is working with local Holocaust Survivors to feature their personal artifacts and photographs during this exciting exhibition's run at the Museum.

Latinx Art in Times of Conflict

On view April 30 - October 17, 2021 in conjunction with the inaugural Silverman Latin American Institute.

The Boniuk Center's Spanish Outreach and Latin American Initiatives is pleased to invite Latinx artists from the Houston area to participate in a juried art exhibition, Withstand: Latinx Art in Times of Conflict.

This exhibition investigates the idea of resistance and its multiple ramifications in the visual arts, as well as the impact of political and/or social conflict on the creative process. *Withstand* is meant to be a platform that examines issues that impact the community, fosters dialogue on

difficult questions, and ultimately empowers social change through art.

Latinx artists from the Greater Houston area are invited to submit their work by November 30, 2020. This is a juried exhibition curated by Guest Curators Rosa Ana Orlando and Gabriela Magana. We are honored to announce Susana Monteverde as juror for the show. Susana is currently a development officer at the University of Houston in the Katherine G. McGovern College of the Arts.



AAM Reaccreditation Process Begins

Holocaust Museum Houston achieved accreditation from the American Alliance of Museums (AAM) in 2012 under the leadership of Tali Blumrosen. It's hard to believe that 10 years have passed so quickly and we are preparing to start the reaccreditation process. During this time, HMH has accomplished much - a beautiful new building and four major galleries – highlighting our core values. AAM-accreditation is the highest national recognition for a museum, signifying excellence in the museum community, to governments, funders, outside agencies and to the public. Accreditation is a rigorous process that examines all aspects of a museum's operations. HMH is one of only four accredited museums in Houston. During the accreditation process, we examined every facet of our organization, from the effectiveness of our educational outreach and quality of our exhibitions, to compliance with our mission, Collections Stewardship and fiscal responsibility. We will begin our AAM-reaccreditation process before this year's end.

Collection Enhancement

Over the last year Holocaust Museum Houston's permanent collection has continued to expand with the addition of compelling artifacts and artwork.

Letta Tayler Gift

New Alice Cahana Painting

HMH has received a wonderful donation of artwork by the late Houston Survivor, Alice Cahana. Donated by Barbara Samuels, the piece is a mixed media painting. Alice and most of her family were sent to Auschwitz shortly after the Germans seized Hungary in March 1944. Her mother and younger brothers were immediately sent to the gas chambers. Alice and her sister were sent to a munitions factory to become slave laborers, and later placed on a death march to Bergen-Belsen. But Alice was fortunate enough to be sent to Sweden upon liberation where she recovered. She later emigrated to Palestine, where she met and married Rabbi Moshe Cahana, and then to the United States. They raised a daughter, Rena, and two sons, both of whom became rabbis. Alice's artwork memorializes and pays tribute to the victims of the Holocaust.







2019-2020 PROGRAM TOTALS




















Judith and Harvey Rosenstock have been involved with Holocaust Museum Houston since its founding in 1996. Recently, one of their friends encouraged Harvey to join the Advisory Board, which is bringing them even closer to the Museum's mission of teaching lessons from the Holocaust and promoting Human Rights.

Harvey's family originated from Germany, Romania and Vilna, formerly part of Poland and now a city in Lithuania. He was raised in a modern orthodox home in the United States and each generation of his family found a way to assist someone emigrating from Europe. "We knew we had to do something to make the world a better place—community service is how our family worked. We were very involved with our Judaism." Harvey was raised to be a lifelong Human Rights activist.

Judith Rosenstock's Lithuanian grandparents immigrated to America before WWI but sadly, none of her Lithuanian relatives survived the Holocaust except for a cousin who had emigrated to Israel before the war. It was this surviving cousin who taught Judith about the Holocaust and she continues to carry her family's stories in her heart believing that they must be kept alive for future generations.

Both Harvey and Judith went on to become distinguished medical professionals serving the Houston community. Harvey attended Arizona State University for his undergraduate work and the University of Oregon Medical School where he received his M.D. in 1966. He pursued his psychiatric residency training at Baylor College of Medicine. Harvey became Board Certified in Psychiatry by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, and practiced psychiatry - both clinical and forensic - for over 45 years. Judith received a B.S. from New York University, an M.S. in Special Education from Virginia Commonwealth University and a Ph.D. in Special Education Administration from Syracuse University. She attended lectures given by Anna Freud. During her career, Judith has been a classroom teacher, a school superintendent, a Consultant in school districts including The Bureau of Indian Affairs, an Assistant Professor at

University of Houston Clear Lake, and she has advocated for the implementation of inclusion laws for children with disabilities in Washington D.C. She is a certified Counselor and still maintains her practice.

Over the years Harvey and Judith have collaborated in the treatment of patients and on major projects. Together they wrote a book about an adolescent which was optioned by Disney, Showtime, and Hallmark and became a movie, "Locked in Silence" staring Bonnie Bedelia. It earned four Emmy Nominations and was the Hallmark's Mother's Day Special. The Rosenstocks also co-authored the book Journey Through Divorce.

Through the years, the Rosenstock family has been deeply committed to Congregation Brith Shalom in Bellaire where Judith and Harvey became dear friends with the late Rabbi Moshe Cahana and his wife, Alice, a Holocaust Survivor and world-renowned Holocaust artist. Harvey and Judith helped edit the Cahanas' script for "The Last Days," which later became one of the five Survivor stories featured in the Steven Spielberg movie. Harvey and Judith were also instrumental in having a piece of Alice's artwork entitled, "No Names," placed in the Vatican. It took over a year, but Pope Benedict XVI gave the Cahanas and the Rosenstocks an audience on the patio of St. Peter's Square. The painting initially was hung at the entrance to the Sistine Chapel; ultimately "No Names" was permanently housed in the Museum of

Vatican among the greatest painters of the 20th Century.

In memory of their close friend, the late Alice Cahana, and in deep appreciation for her art, Judith and Harvey are creating an endowment to support the conservation and preservation of Alice's lifelong work and changing exhibitions at Holocaust Museum Houston. "Judith and I believe that we must reach the next generation and teach them that if one person is hurting then we all are hurting. I want every observer of Alice's art to feel the absolute value of human life across all boundaries."

Holocaust Museum Houston is grateful to the Rosenstocks for sharing their families' poignant stories, for devoting their lives to being Upstanders and for celebrating Alice Cahana's transcending artwork to benefit future generations including their children Amara, Aaron, Ben, Marc and Debbie, and their spouses Jon, Amy and Sarah. This gift is also being made in honor of Harvey and Judith's precious grandchildren Harrison, Madeline, Alex, Jacob, Hannah, Lily and Charlotte. The Rosenstocks look forward to becoming even more engaged with HMH through volunteer opportunities in the future to carry forth the Museum's mission in our community.



A CFriend to CFlolocaust CMuseum CFlouston CDorothy Lee Levinson

Dorothy Lee Levinson was born and raised in Houston, Texas. Her father, Phillip Wiesenthal, was born in Galveston and her mother, Rena Wiesenthal, was born in Colorado and came to Houston by way of marriage. Dorothy's parents owned Southern Specialty Corporation, which sold wholesale sundries. Her mother was recognized as one of the first pharmacists in the country. Houston was the Levinson Family homestead.

Although she eventually left Houston and married the late cardiologist Dr. David Levinson in 1961, Dorothy's heart was never far from the Bayou City. The Levinsons lived in Los Angeles where David had his practice at Cedars Sinai and Cedars Lebanon for 48 years until his passing in 2010. Dorothy still maintains a home on the West Coast but mostly lives in Houston now.

Dorothy didn't come from a particularly religious family but always felt it was important for Judaism to survive and

for the Jewish people to thrive. This was instilled in her from her parents, who were determined to never see another Holocaust and supported the State of Israel even as it was being established. Her maternal grandfather, Lee Alcon, donated land for the State and her mother wrote letters to senators and congressmen rallying interest before the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC) was created in 1963. Dorothy still has some of her mother's cherished

After returning to Houston to live parttime, Dorothy became involved with Holocaust Museum Houston because she believes that it is important for all children to learn about the Holocaust so that we never forget the atrocity and it never happens again. The Museum's mission is to teach lessons of the Holocaust to students at no cost, which means free admission and educational programming to ensure that children have equal access to Holocaust education. Dorothy's vision and the Museum's mission align beautifully.

Dorothy continues to be active with Holocaust Museum Houston and with AIPAC, a family tradition. She recognizes the outstanding gifts the Jewish people have contributed to our society and wishes that all Jewish people respect and have pride in being Jewish.

Holocaust Museum Houston is grateful to Dorothy Lee for her belief in the work that we do to educate the Houston community and beyond about the Holocaust. Her generous philanthropic support brings the Museum closer to fulfilling its mission and to fulfilling Dorothy's vision for Holocaust education. "It is selfless individuals like Dorothy who enable us to look to the future and to teach the lessons of the Holocaust across all generations. Her energy and enthusiasm are infectious to all who know her," said Dr. Kelly J. Zúñiga.
