Activity 1:

On-Site Coexistence Scavenger Hunt

Use scavenger hunt document. Groups can print out or download hunt to a mobile device for onsite use.

Scavenger Hunt

- Step 1: With a partner or in a small group, pick any piece of art to start with.
- Step 2: Discuss the art piece with your partner/group: What do you see? How does the art make you feel? It is okay to disagree with your group as long as everyone is respectful of everyone else.
- Step 3: Find the artist's name on the worksheet and answer the question. There are no wrong answers!
- Step 4: Follow the directions to find a new piece of art.

Next, find another art piece with at least one eye in it.
