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2022 LBJ Moral Courage Award Dinner honoring the late Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg raises \$2 million

Featured performer, Emmy and Tony Award-winning actress and singer Kristin Chenoweth, donates her fee back to the Museum

HOUSTON (May 18, 2022)...Holocaust Museum Houston (HMH) honored Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg (posthumously) with the Lyndon Baines Johnson Moral Courage Award, accepted by the late icon's son James Ginsburg, Tuesday, May 17, 2022, at the Hilton Americas-Houston. Topping off the evening was a rousing performance by Emmy and Tony Award-winning actress and singer Kristin Chenoweth. The soirée raised in excess of \$2 million for general operating funds with a focus on educational programming, making this year's dinner one of the most successful in the Museum's history and the one of the largest with 1,300 guests.

Holocaust Museum Houston presents the Lyndon Baines Johnson Moral Courage Award to individuals who have taken a stand against injustice, hatred and prejudice, and used their skills and influence to make a better world for all people. This year's recipient, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, affectionately called "RBG" by her supporters, has inspired generations of women to break gender barriers. Even after facing gender discrimination as she pursued her academic goals, Ginsburg forged ahead and became the second woman—and first Jewish woman—to serve on the Supreme Court.

The 2022 LBJ Moral Courage Award occurred in conjunction with the exhibition *Notorious RBG:* The Life and Times of Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a vibrant exploration of the life of the judicial trailblazer. The exhibition's only stop in Texas is on view through July 31 in the Josef and Edith Mincberg Gallery at Holocaust Museum Houston's Lester and Sue Smith Campus, 5401 Caroline Street.

"She may have stood only five foot one, but Justice Ginsburg was truly a giant in her work on equality and justice for all," said HMH CEO Dr. Kelly J. Zúñiga. "Like LBJ, RBG is a true American icon where few in history have stood taller in exemplifying what it means to be an upstander. By way of this award and the exhibition, her remarkable story can live on to inspire others."

Under the tutelage of dynamic Dinner Chairs Mady and Ken Kades, the format of the black-tie optional affair was completely redesigned to include messages from Broadway, film and television

stars Billy Crystal, Chita Rivera, Drew McVety, Paulo Szot, Jennifer Nettles and Aaron Sorkin, culminating with an incredible live performance by Emmy and Tony Award-winning actress and singer Kristin Chenoweth.

Chenoweth reigned supreme opening her show singing "I'm A Woman" and covering a variety of hits such as "You Don't Own Me," "Bring Him Home" and "The Way We Were," before treating everyone to "Popular," made famous from her role as the original Glinda in *Wicked*. In between sipping from her Buc-ee's big cup, Chenoweth also covered "Hallelujah," "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," Karen Carpenter's "Yesterday Once More" and "Happy Days Are Here Again" before bringing the crowd to a standing ovation when she announced she would donate her fee back to the Museum once she has paid her team.

An entree of marinated herb Chilean seabass with lemon chardonnay sauce was accompanied by Israeli couscous risotto, squash, zucchini and broccoli. Guests enjoyed swapping desserts of lemon meringue tart and chocolate layered truffle cake with berry coulis. The spectacular flowers and decor were provided by Bergner and Johnson Design.

Holocaust Museum Houston created the Lyndon Baines Johnson Moral Courage Award in 1994 in cooperation with the Johnson family. In 1938, as a young congressman, Johnson stretched the limits of his authority and risked his personal dreams to provide American sanctuary for threatened European Jews. It is because of these acts of moral courage that the Museum proudly

named the award in his honor. The award recognizes either a single righteous act or a lifetime of morally courageous behavior.

Previous recipients have included Brigadier General Felix L. Sparks, posthumously; BakerRipley and the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society; George W. Bush, 43rd President of the United States; Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., posthumously; Holocaust survivor and author Elie Wiesel; activist and actress Mia Farrow; U.S. Sen. John McCain; the late Daniel Pearl, the Wall Street Journal reporter who was murdered by terrorists in Pakistan; former U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell; former U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, Jr.; former U.S. Sen. Robert Dole; filmmaker Steven Spielberg; and former U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, posthumously, among others.
